BANQUET KEYNOTE SPEAKER - KMT SHOCKLEY, Ph.D.



Dr. Kmt Shockley is associate professor of educational transformation at George Mason University, Arlington, Virginia. His work centers on three broad areas: African centered education, teacher education, and educational policy and leadership. Dr. Shockley believes that the American educational system's inability to reach all of its constituency is of critical concern. In relation to African American children, he believes that their education should be focused on the needs of their community, and that any other type of education for them is, in fact, miseducation. Dr. Shockley has written two books that address this overwhelming problem: *Darnell & I: Cultural Truth Telling and the Power of Education*, and he has written *The Miseducation of Black Children*, both are widely available and widely read. He has published

over fifteen articles in some of the top journals in academe. He has traveled throughout North & South American for his commonsensical approach to true education and personal transformation.

Dr. Kmt Shockley holds bachelor's degrees in elementary education and African American Studies, a Master's in Educational Administration, and a Ph.D. in education policy and leadership. He is also a member of the Village Agogo in Ghana, West Africa.

LUNCHEON KEYNOTE SPEAKER - GEORGE HENDERSON, Ph.D.



In 1967 Dr. George Henderson became the third full-time African American professor at the University of Oklahoma's Norman campus. In 1969 he became the first African American professor in Oklahoma to hold an endowed professorship—the Sylvan N. Goldman professorship in human relations. During that same year, he created the University of Oklahoma's Human Relations Program. He served as director/chairperson of Human Relations for twenty-two years. He was also dean of the College of Liberal Studies from 1996 to 2000. That made him the first African American dean of a degree granting college on the Norman campus. The Norman campus's Henderson-Tolson Cultural Center, Henderson Scholars Program, and College of Liberal Studies George Henderson Teaching Award bear his name.

During his nearly forty years tenure at the University of Oklahoma, Dr. Henderson was awarded four distinguished professorships, and numerous other teaching and service awards. Also, he presented cultural diversity and sexual harassment lectures and workshops to hundreds of local, state and national organizations. Most of his thirty books address those topics.

In 2003, Dr. Henderson was inducted into the Oklahoma Higher Education Hall of Fame, and also the Oklahoma Hall of Fame. Furthermore, the Oklahoma Human Rights Commission and the Norman Human Rights Commission have recognized him for his numerous contributions to improving race relations throughout Oklahoma and the nation.

In September 2010, the University of Oklahoma Press will publish Dr. Henderson's thirty-first book, *Race and the University: A Memoir*. The book will describe some of his academic and community challenges and accomplishments. In his own words, he is an ordinary man who, with the support of a lot of individuals, has been able to do several extraordinary things.
